EBBA ARCHITECTS

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This design report has been produced for Beaconsfield Gallery by EBBA ARCHITECTS, as a basis for the update and possible development of the building; to provide ideas for the future benefit of the usage, experience and efficiency of the existing and proposed spaces. This conversation started with a simple idea to try to bring a new lease of life to the gallery, as a way of activating and building on the community engagement aspects. Ultimately the aim is to consider ways of facilitating further investment into the gallery and its running for years to come.

The following pages outline our concept for these simple and sensitive interventions. We have included a series of drawings that are representational of the feel for each part of the project, as well as showing the ideas for various development phases which could be implemented over a longer period of time.

Our proposals can be summarised as three interventions. In its most simplest form, we would look provide an accessible route up to the main gallery space while also considering how the space works at ground level. Secondly, we are interested in providing a different viewing perspective and more floor area through a mezzanine level, that can act as a platform for exhibition space and performances. Lastly, we are interested in extending the use of the gallery via a new storey (or two) above. This would dramatically increase the use of the gallery and help to create new activities, including wider community involvement and rentable studio space/offices.

From a material and architectural perspective, we have taken queues from the existing building, while also looking at introducing a new yet simple language that will help to tie the building and the interventions together.

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
INTRODUCTION


As a studio we are interested in the things that give a place it's sense of character, of which there are many in the different spaces and characteristics of Beaconsfield Gallery. In these photographs and in our research we have tried to capture some of the things we are drawn to. These include elements such as the rich history and previous uses of the building which can still be read in the floor and predominantly utilitarian ground level. Other elements that we are drawn to are the delicate windows and elegant openings that give the exterior its presence. We are interested in the accumulation of different things over time, some designed while others installed for function.

Our intention is to consider the architecture and the use of the building and to add things that will help to retain the character while giving the building a new life and a renewed image. With this in mind we are often drawn to particular references that help to drive certain ideas. Here we have looked to the works of Ilona Nemeth, a Slovak artist that is interested in the identity of objects and the reflection of key historical moments of her recent past. Utilitarian objects can carry different meanings to many people, while some have a very strong ideological resonance, and change depending on where they are sited. This idea of the placement of objects and the intended use is of interest to us when thinking of how to adapt and add things onto a building.


NEW VIEWING PLATFORM





SCULPTURAL ROUTE


Taking into consideration the addition of a new extension to the roof, the following examples look to add a route through the gallery to connect to these spaces. The programme of the spaces could be adapted to the requirements of the gallery, while we would like to see people explore the building and view the gallery from a new perspective.

The first of these looks to wrap a steel framed structure up around the gallery space, holding within it a stair that takes visitors up to the floor above.


STAIR | PROCESSIONAL ROUTE


















04_ADDITIONAL SPACE / EXTENSION NEW GALLERY & EXHIBITION SPACES, COMMUNITY USES & STUDIOS

The following chapter looks at ways of creating additional space in the form of a roof extension. The size of this will be determined by the amount of space required and the planning restrictions that we might be limited by. The language of this extension would be something contemporary yet sensitive to the character of the existing building. We have explored numerous forms and material qualities that we think would create an exciting and elegant addition to the gallery.












Lift access to roof level




















This option explores an extruded glass, fibre glass or polycarbonate mass, which would appear as a floating light box, that changes throughout the day into the night

















This looks at the possibility for having multiple self contained pavilions, wrapped by a mesh or plastic which again would offer an interesting play of shadows throughout the day and night
